Abilene	Our Abilene Aggie Mom's club had a full year that started off with our HOWDY party in July welcoming new Ags and their families. We have door prizes that include donated gift cards for CSB food places for the new Ags. Our regular meetings kick off on the 3rd Monday beginning in Sept and running through April. We incorporate local Aggies to come speak about their time at A&M and the lifelong connections of the Aggie network. This year our speakers incorporated the foundational core values into their presentations. In addition to regular meetings, we have socials including BUNKO, paint your pottery and more. Twice a year we do BTHO Finals bags. We were able to donate money to several A&M organizations that are submitted and voted on by membership. We also participate in Aggie Mom's boutique with a raffle that allows us to award two-three \$1500 scholarships to local aggies.
Alvin	At the close of the 2024–2025 year, the Alvin Club was preparing to dissolve. In August 2025, I was asked to step in and attempt to restart the organization. With the support of the former treasurer—who agreed to return—and the recruitment of an additional new member to serve as Secretary, we began the process of rebuilding the Club's foundation. At that time, the Club had less than \$150 remaining in an account that was not set up in accordance with current Federation or banking requirements, and the PO Box had lapsed. Over the next three months, we worked diligently to update and file all necessary formation documents and to establish a compliant new bank account. An additional month was required to reinstate the PO Box. By February, all administrative and operational structures were finally in order, allowing us to shift our focus to growth. Since February, the Alvin Club has expanded from 3 members to 12, and our financial position has strengthened significantly. We now have a little over \$2,000 as we prepare for the 2026–2027 year. With the administrative challenges resolved and a solid foundation in place, our priorities moving forward will center on continued active membership growth and the launch of structured fundraising efforts to support the Club's long-term success. I also want to personally thank the Pearland/Friendswood Aggie Moms, especially Dana Lowe-Tuggle, for their mentorship and welcoming support as we have been re-building.
Amarillo	Our club met 6 times this past school year. We started with a First Day of College Social; had a couple business meetings to fellowship and brag on our Aggie students; we put together Exam Packs to give to our Aggie Students over Thanksgiving; then we had a Christmas Ornament Exchange party; and we finished our year hosting a Howdy Meeting in May for all the Summer/Fall 2026 incoming students and their families.
Angelina County	We raised money for scholarships, met monthly from September to May to support our students and held our annual Howdy event in July.
Arizona	The 2025–2026 year was one of growth, connection, and service for the Texas A&M Arizona Aggie Moms Club. Our primary goal was to increase membership, and we are proud to report that we exceeded that goal by growing our membership by more than 25% over the previous year. We kicked off the year with our annual Howdy Party in September, where members had the opportunity to connect with new Aggie Moms and strengthen existing friendships. A special highlight of the event was a virtual visit from one of Texas A&M's Yell Leaders, who taught us Aggie yells and shared insights into the traditions and spirit that make Texas A&M so unique. Throughout the year, our club hosted a variety of social, service, and fundraising events, including a football watch party, wine tasting gathering, holiday celebration, wine bottle decorating event, fundraising activities, and our year-end party. We also came together twice for Finals Week Packing Parties, preparing care packages and goodie boxes to encourage our Aggies during their exams. One of the highlights of the year was hosting the Singing Cadets during their Arizona visit in May. Their performance provided a wonderful opportunity to showcase Aggie Spirit while strengthening our connection to Texas A&M.

	Thanks to the generosity and participation of our members through fundraising we were able to award three \$400 scholarships to deserving students. In addition, we provided financial support to both the Texas A&M BUILD Program and the Singing Cadets. We were also delighted to purchase Christmas gifts for our Aggies and honor our graduating Aggie Moms with special gifts recognizing their family's achievement. Beyond the events and contributions, one of our greatest accomplishments was fostering meaningful relationships among our members. The wisdom and experiences of our senior Aggie Moms were shared with newer members, creating a supportive community where friendships flourished and Aggie traditions were passed from one generation to the next. The Texas A&M Arizona Aggie Moms Club remains committed to supporting our students, promoting Aggie Spirit, and building lasting connections among Aggie families. We are grateful for a successful year and look forward to continuing our mission in the years ahead.
Atascosa County	Our club had a very fun and successful year. We had 36 members and participated in 2 fundraisers including pecan sales and a skeet shoot. We were able to award 14 scholarships to students in Pleasanton, Jourdanton, and Poteet.
Austin	Austin Aggie Moms impact and outreach efforts for 2025-2026: CORPS MARCH. Raised \$2,000 to provide water and snacks for 1,600 cadets in downtown Austin at the conclusion of the march prior to the t.u. football game. GIVING. Awarded \$9,200 to 13 campus organizations, as well as the Singing Cadets and the Veteran Resource Center. GOODY BAGS. Prepared and delivered 170 bags for the fall/spring semesters to students and veterans. GRADUATES. 16 grads received their first year in the Association of Former Students for free (member perk) HOWDY SOCIAL & AGGIE MOM 101. 126 freshmen and parents attended our Howdy Social, a summer kickoff event, with our speaker, Association VP, Dr. Vicki Dobiyanski. At Aggie Mom 101, 65 fish moms learned about move-in day, howdy week, Corps orientation, recruitment week, meal plans, campus mail, dining plans, campus organizations and more. MEMBERSHIP. Increased membership from the previous year by 17.8% MERCHANDISE/ONLINE STORE. Increased online and in-person sales by 54% and participated in both Aggie Mom Camp and Boutique Weekend. PHILANTHROPY. Collected 3 vanloads of food for Pocket Pantry (fall). Collected 1 vanload of clothing for The Closet (spring), as well as two wagon loads of feminine hygiene and personal care items for 12th Can (spring). Ring of Honor moms conducted a "Big Event" project with the Austin Area Food Bank. PROGRAMS. Hosted 9 speakers and 8 meetings, including: Student Body President, Ross Volunteer, VP of Student Affairs, University Police Department Chief, College of Vet Med (Rev's Vet), Vice Chancellor and Dean of the College of Ag & Life Sciences and the Advisor for Student Media. SCHOLARSHIPS. Awarded \$21,000 to 26 scholars from the Austin area, as well as 7 endowed scholars. Funding is 60% complete on a seventh endowment, the Foundation Excellence Award, due to be fully funded in 2028. We also awarded 4 Fish Camp scholarships to Austin-area incoming freshmen. SOCIAL MEDIA/MARKETING. Re-designed and launched a new club website and re-designed Square storefront for online merchandise. Added a new board member, VP Marketing & Communication. Increased our Instagram followers by 137% and Facebook followers by 20%. Successfully transitioned all signups, event RSVPs, event and raffle ticket sales, membership, sponsorship and goody bag sales to the Cheddar Up platform. SOCIALS. Conducted 11 socials for general members and Ring of Honor moms.
Austin County	What a wonderful year it has been for the Austin County Texas A&M Mother's Club! We kicked off the year in August with a Howdy Party at Wolf Pack in Sealy, where new members enjoyed dinner, refreshments, fun door prizes, and the opportunity to learn more about our club and mission. Throughout the fall, we held our Quilt Raffle to help raise scholarship funds, and also enjoyed a fun custom woodworking and painting event at Tip Top Workshop in Bellville, where we created custom A&M frames. During the holiday season, we gathered for a festive Christmas Party at Huff Brewery and had a great time playing BUNCO together. In January, we hosted a chili supper with our Aggie students and scholarship winners, giving us a special time to connect and celebrate them. Bandera County	Bandera County Aggie Moms got together to do Fall and Spring Exam bags and arrange delivery to campus. We were finally able to elect a new board in late April. We are hoping to revive the club with incoming Aggie Moms.
Bastrop County	Our goal was to raise \$26,000 for scholarships, and we nearly doubled that goal with over \$50,000 raised! This is only made possible by the moms who work tirelessly throughout the year making our famous mosaic flower pots! In addition to selling our pots during our Christmas sale and at Boutique, we raffled off 2 one-of-a-kind pots. Our socials this year included our Annual Howdy Party to welcome incoming Aggies, our first Whoop & Weep Social, our "Momsgiving" Potluck, our annual Christmas Party, and our End Of Year Celebration. Our monthly business meetings are held the 4th Monday of each month. We also hosted a monthly mom-raderie activity/game/craft or host a guest speaker. We stuffed and distributed almost 100 goody bags to our Aggies for Halloween and fall/spring finals. We also partnered with the Bastrop County A&M Club to help with Aggie Muster. We are so thankful to all the moms, customers and donors who made our mission to support our local Aggies possible, and we look forward to another great year! Gig 'em!
Baytown	The Baytown Aggie Moms Club had an incredibly successful year focused on growth, connection, and strengthening relationships within our extended Aggie family. We also attended the Aggie Night with the Houston Astros with several members and their families. During the spring semester, we welcomed guest speaker Jacquelyn Wieland, who spoke on leadership, communication, and leading with confidence. In March, a fellow Aggie Mom and owner of Bahama Buck's generously provided a soda bar, while another member hosted a fun Aggie hat bar for attendees. It was a night where members enjoyed a lively Bunco night filled with door prizes and fellowship. We also participated in both the Aggie Mom Mini Boutique at Aggie Mom Camp and the Family Weekend Aggie Mom Boutique. At the Family Weekend Aggie Mom Boutique we held our first successful raffle. This year, our club made a special effort to expand our community outreach and establish new partnerships throughout the area. 	hosted Muster and gave out their scholarships. We currently have 49 active members and are excited about the continued growth and success of our club in the coming year.
Beaumont	The Beaumont Aggie Moms Club celebrated an outstanding year of supporting Texas A&M students while proudly marking our 93rd year as a club. We kicked off the academic year with our annual Sip and Sob gathering and continued with monthly meetings that fostered friendship, fellowship, and support among our members. We were honored to receive a Membership Growth Award in recognition of achieving a membership increase of more than 25%, reflecting the enthusiasm and commitment of our members. Throughout the year, we distributed more than 60 TLC bags each semester to encourage and support our Aggies. During our Christmas Party, members assembled TLC bags for students preparing for finals, and at our February meeting, we created and mailed Valentine cards to remind our Aggies they were loved and supported from home. Thanks to the generosity of our members and supporters, we proudly awarded eight scholarships of \$850 each, totaling \$6,800. Bee County	The Bee County Aggie Mothers' Club kicked off the year with a successful Howdy Party and membership drive, increasing membership from 10 members to nearly 30. Memberships included new maroon Gig'EM t-shirts and the option for members to purchase the semester gift bag for their students. During football season, the club held its first fundraiser, "You've Been Giggled," which generated strong community support and brought attention to our organization by placing yard signs in yards and surprising Aggie fans and other school fans alike. We delivered approximately 20 bags to students in December. Our club was acknowledged in the spring during parents' weekend for our increased membership rate. We also hosted our annual spring raffle, featuring more than 27 donated prizes and raising \$6,200. Brush Country	Celebrated our 80th anniversary! Awarded five scholarships totaling \$1,250, served twenty-two members and delivered thirty-seven goody bags.
Burleson County	The Burleson County Aggie Moms summer began gearing up for their only scholarship fundraiser, the Kolache Krunch 5K which is held the second Saturday of September. BCAMC started their school year with a back to school Howdy Social for all Aggies and their moms at an outdoor space in Caldwell. The event ran in conjunction with the local high school's meet the athletes night. In September, we welcomed 423 runners and numerous fans to cheer them on. The Aggies who could make it, helped make the race run seamlessly. By November the BCAMC board had revised the bylaws, presented them to the membership, held a vote, then sent the newly passed bylaws to the Federation by their deadline. Coastal Bend	The Coastal Bend Aggie Moms' Club raised enough money to give 12 scholarships to incoming freshmen. Every year we have exceeded our fundraising goals and we are just getting better. Through goody bags, raffle tickets, private donations, and The Kendra Scott give back; we were able to give these scholarships. We also helped the foster students during goody bag pick up. We are a small group but have huge hearts for our students.
Coleman County	TAMU Mother's Club supports the current Aggies, TAMU student organizations, and the University. We held a community Christmas fundraiser for local scholarships. Serve at Muster and introduced our High School Seniors to the Aggie Community at Muster.
Collin County	We kicked off 2025-26 in June with our annual Howdy Party to welcome incoming freshmen and transfer students from the Collin County area. Our second annual Howdy Week: Aggie Moms Style kept us busy in September. Events/activities this year included a football watching party (BTHO Notre Dame) with the McKinney Aggie Club, our New Moms Welcome and first general meeting of the year, a breakfast at a local restaurant, miniature golf and we rounded out the week with a new fundraising event - Aggies on the Court: Pickleball for a Purpose. It's a week filled with fun activities and a way for moms to get to know each other and connect with a familiar face at our monthly meetings. Our general meetings took on a different look this year as we opted for more social time and kept the business portion of the meetings to a minimum. Lots of fun, laughter and Aggie Mom sisterhood connections were made during a scavenger hunt, our annual Boo Market and Trick or Treat goodie bags, Holiday Party and Ornament Exchange, an 80's dance party, movie night and flower arranging. Our only speaker this year was at our November meeting who spoke about the Aggie Recovery Community and the "Bubba" Bag Christmas Project. 	KEEPING OUR MEMBERS INFORMED: We have several ways in which we reach out to our members to keep them informed of club events and activities as well as happenings with the Federation and at Texas A&M. Our monthly newsletter offers information on club activities, meetings, fundraising opportunities, Federation information and activities for neighboring Aggie Moms Clubs and local Aggie Clubs. Social media plays an important role in reaching not only our members but the general public: our Facebook PAGE (public) is a popular means for us to advertise our events, meetings, scholarship opportunities, graduate recognitions and fundraising activities; while our Facebook GROUP (private) site is used to communicate privately within our membership. Something new we tried this year and hope to implement on a more regular basis going forward is the use of texting members through texting software to keep members apprised of activities and reminders of events such as monthly meetings. This software proved invaluable during goodie bag distribution and for last call for tickets sales during our raffles. FUNDRAISING: Giving back to Texas A&M University through our fundraising efforts continues to be a strong part of who CCAM is. Our major fundraising efforts include our Goodie Bag sales, annual Pecan and Poinsettia Sales, as well as our Boutique Sales during our Howdy Party, News Moms Welcome, the Dallas County Aggie Moms Howdy Holiday Market and Parents Weekend Boutique. Our raffles were quite successful this year as we raffled off two Louis Vuitton purses helping to raise over \$8,400. A new fundraiser this year was our Aggies on the Court: Pickleball for a Purpose Tournament and silent auction. Overall, we raised over \$41,000 of which \$22,000 (\$1,000) scholarships were awarded to Collin County students, \$13,000 will be distributed to student organizations and \$6,000 will be applied to our 3rd endowed scholarship.
Comal County	The Comal County Texas A&M University Mothers' Club began our 2025-2026 academic year with our annual Howdy Ice Cream Social. We again had a great crew of new and returning Aggie students. We sold nearly 400 ornaments this year and hope to see those numbers continue to climb.
